to serve as your local councillors and be actively involved in our diverse and flourishing community.



#### YOUR CONSERVATIVE COUNCIL

That is why as Conservatives we have eliminated unnecessary and wasteful expenditure from Elmbridge Borough Council achieving savings of nearly £10 million over the past 7 years. Elmbridge continues to be not only one of the highest performing Councils in the country but also one of the most sought after boroughs to live in. This year will see a reduction in central government funding of £550k which is 28% less than we received last year (Elmbridge now receives just £21 towards the £125 annual spend per resident). To cover a proportion of that shortfall we are having to increase the Elmbridge element of the Council Tax by £3.93 per year for a Band D household. This will ensure we can continue to deliver those vital services you rightly expect from your Council.

#### **OUR ACHIEVEMENTS**

Since taking control of the council we have

- Invested in the improvement of our town centres through grants from the Elmbridge Civic Improvement Fund.
- Achieved zero Borough Council Tax increases in 7 out of the last 10 years (the Residents' Political Parties put up taxes in 12 out of 13 years).
- Given local communities access to funding for improvements to their locality through the Community Infrastructure Levy.
- Increased funding to the voluntary sector and provided use of the Elmbridge Community Hub.
- Worked closely with our partners to provide in excess of 1000 affordable homes in the borough.
- Put the Council on a strong financial footing with robust governance and accountability.
- Seen the level of residents' satisfaction with our services rise to an all time high of 88%.
- Planned to start the building of a state-of-the-art Sports Hub in Walton.
- Reviewed all key contracts for example, waste collection, maintenance of green spaces and CCTV monitoring - to deliver the best value for money.
- Pursued joint working with other local authorities, Surrey Police and key stakeholders to provide more effective services.

## CARING AND CAMPAIGNING IN HERSHAM VILLAGE

### **RES DEVELOPMENT**

Our children's education is of paramount importance, and Ruth, Mary and John have welcomed RES/Rydens School's scheme to redevelop the site of their existing school for housing, to enable them to build an outstandingly good new educational campus nearby. We have worked with residents and represented their concerns, especially on the access to the proposed housing development, and its internal layout for the housing units. A significant achievement, after negotiations with the developers, has been to limit the expected traffic through Felcott Road. Now it is proposed most of the units will be accessed via the Hersham Road entrance.



### **HERSHAM CENTRE FOR THE COMMUNITY**

Hersham's Centre for the Community continues to thrive with a full programme of activities. As one of Elmbridge's seven Centres, it is a precious asset, a focus for care in the community, maintained



with volunteer help, and one which Mary, Ruth and John have consistently pledged to support. Our Centre has recently benefitted from the refurbishment of a Shower Room and Therapy Room, assisted by a financial contribution from pupils of RES/Rydens School. Many will fondly remember the special events put on by the Centre throughout the year, some complementing other activities such as the summer concert in the Memorial Gardens and other seasonal events.

### **NEW BERRY LANE**

Our long admired Burhill School for Infants has undergone a successful transformation into the larger Burhill Primary School, to meet the needs of the expanding population. However, its new entrances in New Berry Lane, intended to relieve traffic congestion in Pleasant Place, have brought a similar problem to this private road, created specifically to serve only Paul Vanson Court. Crowds of parents and children, unaware of the lane's special status, have streamed across it at the beginning and end of the school day, coming into conflict with traffic in and out of the sheltered housing site. By bringing together the residents, the school headteacher and the lane owners Elmbridge Council, your Hersham Conservative councillors have restored harmony, securing safety measures in the form of painted crossing points and extensive signage, whilst talks with the Surrey Education Authority are progressing, to deal properly with the problems arising from the new entrances.
